In 2025/26, the programme will support 30 primary schools across Wokingham.

What is Neurodiversity

Neurodiversity


The natural variation in how people's brains process information and experience the world

Neurodivergent

A term used to describe someone whose brain processes information, learns, and/or behaves differently from what is considered "typical". Neurodivergent people may have different strengths and challenges, and can benefit from education and programs that help them develop their strengths

Neurotypical

Is used to describe people whose brain functions, ways of processing information and behaviours are seen to be standard



What the Programme Will Do

Work closely with schools through a whole school approach to make sure every child feels understood and supported. Through a tailored support package for each school, the aim is to:

- Help strengthen partnerships between parents and schools
- ♠ Help schools feel more confident in supporting neurodiverse children
- Help create calmer, more inclusive classrooms that meet children's everyday needs
- Help build a school culture where all children can thrive, and other support strategies can succeed.

What we do

We listen to and speak up for families who have a child or young person (aged 0–25) with any Special Educational Need or Disability (SEND)

We:

- Share your collective experiences with decision-makers
- Work in partnership with education, health and social care
- **Make** sure services are **planned and delivered** in ways that meet the real needs of children and young people with SEND

We do this through

 - Consultations & Surveys

What we offer SEND parent carers



- Membership (FREE) includes half-termly updates on the work that we are doing as well as our upcoming events. We are currently also able to offer our members a free Max Card (which gives discounts to attractions across the UK)
- Updates with WBC & Health on SEND Improvements in the Borough
- We host **SENDIASS training courses** on the EHCP Process, Annual Review Process, SEN Support & Communication and Preparing for Adulthood
- **Events like our Local Offer Live** Family Information & Fun Day
- Drop-in & Chat sessions to meet other families and get support
- Local Offer Guide and SEND Guide for Parents both available on-line and in hard copy
- Opportunities to take part in **consultations and focus groups** to help improve services in the Borough

Will this be rolled out to all schools including senior schools and early years settings?

The PINS project has agreed funding for 1 year. All the learnings from the project will be collated and shared with all schools in the Borough through various school forums and SENCo network meetings. Schools who are part of a Trust will also disseminate relevant learning to all their schools. At the end of the project, any learnings from PINS will be considered when shaping the commissioning of services for schools across the borough to support sustainable change and enhance the training and support currently available for schools in Wokingham.

Will the parent sessions have school staff there?

No. The sessions are for parents and carers only. The collective themes and feedback discussed during the parent sessions will be shared with the school separately.

What type of support will the schools get? What was commissioned in other areas?

The support provided to schools will be guided by the findings from both the school and parent surveys. These results will shape a tailored menu of support that will be commissioned. In areas that participated in Year 1 of this project, examples of commissioned support included:

- Workshops for lunchtime staff on understanding ARFID and how to support pupils with complex eating needs
- A workshop on building emotional resilience
- Training for Governors on neurodiversity and making reasonable adjustments
- Sensory environment audits followed by actionable plans

What is the difference between SENDIASS and SEND Voices Wokingham? SENDIASS (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Information, Advice and Support Service)

SENDIASS is a free, impartial service that offers information, advice, and support to young people with SEND and their parents or carers. They help families understand the SEND system, their legal rights, and available resources. Support includes guidance on:

- SEN support in schools
- Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCPs) and reviews
- Mediation and tribunals

Although part of Wokingham Borough Council (WBC), SENDIASS operates independently from the WBC SEND and Children with Disabilities Teams and provides support to individuals.

SEND Voices Wokingham

SEND Voices Wokingham is the independent parent carer forum for the Borough and is a registered charity.

They represent the collective voice of parent carers of children and young people (aged 0–25) with SEND. Their role includes:

- Gathering and sharing feedback from parent carers about what is working and what needs improvement
- Working with Education, Health and Social Care to influence local services and policies
- Organising events, training, and producing helpful guides
- Signposting families to services (note: they do not support individuals directly)
